Reports

President ~ Susan Hooper

It doesn't seem that long ago I was preparing to take on the challenge and the daunting thought of leading a Club of some 35 members. Considering this Rotary year of "Serve to Change Lives" began with so many uncertainties, and having our second consecutive Changeover via zoom owing to lockdowns and restrictions on public gatherings, we have come out the other side of the Covid-19 pandemic extremely well.

And hence the year began with many uncertainties owing to the pandemic and its ensuing lockdowns. We resumed physical meetings in November only to revert back to zoom meetings in January/February and resuming face to face again in March. Any forward planning always contained an element of "what if".

Members were encouraged to participate in projects where they could contribute individually and still have an impact. When you stop and think to yourself, there are actually quite a number of activities that we as Rotarians, can actually do as individuals, and collectively we make a difference. On reflection over the year, we have touched on all seven of RI's Areas of Focus, and the five Avenues of Service. In particular, I believe our "Masketeers" project alone exemplified Rotary's four core strategic objectives of Impact, Reach, Engagement, and Adaptation.

We set out at the very beginning with a positive outlook in selecting 18 goals from 25 goals as set out by RI with a minimum of 13 to be achieved. I congratulate all our Club members on a fantastic achievement of 16 goals. The remaining two were revised to zero – one being seen as unachievable and the other where the program became unavailable.

We scheduled 11 monthly Board meetings all via zoom and my sincere thanks and gratitude to the Board members for carrying out their roles and to keep administration and projects moving forward. Our regular Club meetings have been a mix of zoom only and hybrid.

Membership is always at the top of minds when it comes to the viability of any organisation. It is with much disappointment, but quite understandable, we are losing three very valued members and partners due to their personal circumstances. To Ross Dickson, John Olive, and John Rodstrom, we wish them well in their Rotary retirement. However, it is also with much pleasure, we welcome Ross, John and John as Honorary members of the Rotary Club of Morisset. On the "up" side of this, it is also my pleasure to welcome into our Club over this past year; Anne Hewitt, Katie van der Watt, Bruce Richardson, Theresa Singhdeo and transferring member Monique O'Keefe. A net gain of two members. We have survived the pandemic!

A Club does not function without the input of all the members. Each of us contributes in ways we are comfortable with and to a level we are capable of, and always considering that peoples' circumstances change. Quite often there are many members quietly working away in the background doing things that others don't see.

In addition to the above, I express my gratitude to Narelle Moran for following up on members' wellbeing and managing the weekly raffle; to Mick Payze for logistical problem solving; to Craig Johnson for his technical expertise and hosting our zoom meetings; to Pauline Eade for meeting programs; and to Mike Baudinette for keeping us in the face of the community with his regular Facebook postings.

My sincere thanks and gratitude to all for your support, your encouragement, your wisdom, your friendship.

Administration

Vice President: Kerry Morrissey – for stepping in to represent the President during times of absence, especially for welcoming visiting Rotarians from outside our region to our local area at the RAWCS Eastern Region Conference.

Projects: To all Club Members ~ Thank You!

International: DDF Project plus personal donations – Sisters of Dominican Orphanage Farm, Tibar, west of Dili, Timor Leste: Project Manager, Barbara Walsh – our Club adopted the farm program some five years ago. The project has been hampered by a cyclone, severe storms, and Covid-19. Products from the farm reduce expenditure on food immensely for the children and increases the quality of nutrition resulting in better health and a better ability to learn. Global Grant funding is being explored to restore vital water infrastructure.

International: RAWCS Project - Health Clinic in Morogoro, Tanzania: Project Manager, Eleni Comino - is to be commended for an outstanding achievement for undertaking such a project from the age of 16 through to completion and final acquittal. The four-stage project over six years which raised awareness of public health, sanitation and youth health engagement, was completed on budget in February 2022.

Musical Instrument Collection – carried over from 2020-2021 collecting unwanted/in need of repair, guitars for refurbishment and then being donated to schools.

Lids4Kids – carried over from 2020-2021 collecting plastic lids from certain containers for recycling into new products such as clipboards, keyrings, coasters, combs, earrings and more.

Bread Tags for Wheelchairs – collecting plastic bread tags for recycling into wheelchairs.

“Masketeers” – carried over from 2020-2021 under the direction of Kerry Morrissey, members negotiated the pandemic lockdowns and local government border restrictions and still managed to produce quantities to distribute locally and overseas. This was a project involving several members for different stages.

Shipments to overseas destinations included: Fiji, India, Mauritius x2, Papua New Guinea x3, Tanzania x2; Timor Leste x3; Arizona USA. Destinations closer to home included Walgett; Dubbo; Broken Hill; and our own local Morisset community via SCS and Morisset Baptist Church. The Royal Flying Doctor Service delivered on our behalf to remote indigenous communities in NSW and SA. Funding included donations of cash from other Rotary Clubs, resources, and product including a very generous contribution by Bed Head Hats of Martinsville; and other resources were supplemented with Club funds

Christmas Trailer Raffle – I commend Pauline Eade for taking the lead in the physical return of the Christmas Trailer Raffle following the online version in 2020. Clients within Morisset Square had changed, plus also dealing with Covid-19 regulations changed the dynamics for shoppers and passers-by. To assist in maximising our return, we set up a “mobile station” and operated from Bunnings Morisset and Bonnells Bay Shopping Centre. The support of the business community with donations to the amount of some \$15,000 is to be commended giving us a return in excess of \$13,000.



National Bird Count – counting birds for 20-minute segments over seven days in October and recording your findings on an APP.

TOMRA Return and Earn – this project was a long time in the making and thanks are extended to Craig Johnson for the set up. Plastic, glass and cardboard drink containers were collected for recycling. Our Club had a designated time slot at four locations from October to April whereby people could select Morisset Rotary Club as the receiver of the 10 cents per container.

Homeless and Needy in our Local Morisset Community – Melanie Fahey-Sconce and Narelle Moran attended a zoom meeting hosted by Terrigal Rotary Club (District 9685) who were looking to support the homeless. They came away with the idea we could initiate our own project/s in the local Morisset community, and proceeded to make contact and to work with SCS as to how we could contribute.

Donations of cash and donated items contributed to the “Personal Care Packs” and almost 100 packs have been made up, distributed, and welcomed. Members and friends knitted upwards of 100 beanies and some scarves. Donations of knitting yarn and socks for the “Winter Warmers” component of the project were received, plus some supplementary funding by the Club. These items were also very much welcomed once the colder months arrived.

Let’s Fish Festival – our Club responded to a request from LMCC to provide carparking duties for one day at Rathmines Park.

Yunung Community Garden – provided assistance for a working bee in the garden. Wednesday is the best day of the week to be there, however, community and Club members can contribute any week-day.

The Newcastle Show BBQ Trailer – an event over three days which normally has an excellent return. Despite the odds being against us with unsettled weather following severe flooding in northern NSW, the non-attendance of farmers and country folk alike who were otherwise preoccupied taking care of their stock; and the State only just

coming to terms with pandemic restrictions easing; a decision was made to proceed and we came away with a small profit for our efforts.

Drink containers were also collected for our Return and Earn recycling project.

Clean Up Australia Day – a small number of members participated but the date also clashed with the Newcastle Show.

Men’s Health Education Rural Van (“MHERV”) – providing reception duties for the nurse over two days while the van was situated at Bunnings Morisset. The nurse provides no appointment necessary, free, basic medical check-ups for men and for ladies too. The project is saving lives with some people being referred to see their doctor immediately.

Science and Engineering Challenge – providing assistance to the Committee to help run the event over five days of competition for Year 10 students and which focuses on the STEM subjects.

Lake Mac Autumn Fair – a one-day event at Speers Pont Park under the guidance of the Rotary Club of Warners Bay and the Committee formed by representatives of the Rotary Clubs from around Lake Macquarie. Thanks are extended to Mick Payze for representing Morisset Rotary. Rotary programs are displayed, Rotary Clubs have fundraisers, and various duties are allocated for a fun community day out. Morisset Rotary Club participated with their now famous “Dunny Roll Toss”. Our Club also undertook the role of supplying and serving morning tea to the VIP party.

Iron Man Port to Port Bike Ride – a one-day event cancelled owing to unsafe wet riding conditions. However, thanks are extended to members and friends who at short notice, volunteered to assist.

RAWCS Eastern Region Conference – the third attempt during the year for our Club to host this two-day event was successful in May. This was attended by local Rotarians and Rotarians from other Districts.

- Contact with PCYC has been re-established following the appointment of a new Manager, Sarah Lenton - it is anticipated PCYC will be forming a community group and to include a representative from Morisset Rotary Club to move forward in supporting this organisation for young people



Report to Members Year Ended 30th June 2022

The financial report for the Rotary Club of Morisset Incorporated includes an Income and Expenditure report and Statement of Financial Position for both the Fundraising (Community) Account, the Members (General) Account and the Timor Leste Project account.

The General Account is showing a surplus for the year of \$1,161.18 (2021 \$4,286.09) and Accumulated funds of \$10,695.30 (2021 \$9,534.12).

The Community Account is showing a deficit for the year of \$5,862.48 (2021 surplus \$4,845.39) and Accumulated Funds of \$27328.69 (2021 \$33,191.17).

The Timor Leste Special Account is showing a surplus for the year of \$2,000.00 (2021 surplus \$2,922.25) and Accumulated Funds of \$5,922.25 (2021 \$3,922.25).

The Morogoro Hospital Special Account has been closed as this project has now been concluded.

The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis. Any capital items acquired by the Club are expensed in the year in which they are acquired or purchased.

The debtors in the General account consist of \$88.29 due from Square for late paid dinner fees and raffle ticket sales at the changeover function and \$85.00 of unpaid members fees. The debtors in the Community account consist of \$610.00 payable by Bonnells Bay Post Office for Covid mask sales.

The Community Account Statement of Financial Position includes the stock of #joinrotary tee shirts and hats as required by the Auditor.

The Community Account Income and Expenditure Report shows where the funds raised from the public were applied. The Rotary Club of Morisset Inc did not use traders in any of its fund raising activities.

In the opinion of the officers of the Rotary Club of Morisset the Community Account Statement of Financial Position and Income and Expenditure Report give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the fundraising appeals of the Club and the Club is able to meet its financial commitments as and when they fall due.

The provisions of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991, the regulations under the Act and the conditions attached to the Authority to Fundraise for Charitable Purposes have been complied with by the Club.

The internal controls exercised by the Club are appropriate and effective in accounting for all income received and applied by the Club from any of its fundraising appeals

Morisset masks up

The Rotary Club of Morisset has found their niche making masks for COVID-ravaged communities in Australia and abroad.

With the onset of the pandemic and the initial lockdowns in Australia, the Rotary Club of Morisset, NSW, like many clubs, had to put their projects and fundraising on hold. But feeling the need to do something to help, members formed a group to make high-quality, handmade fabric masks. Working socially distanced, masked, and under a COVID-safe plan, the group – calling themselves the Maskateers – cut, pinned, ironed, sewed, looped and sealed hundreds of masks. While the club had remained strong over Zoom, these working sessions gave members the much-needed purpose and social bonding that comes from pitching in together. Initially, the masks were donated locally to organisations and church groups that worked with disadvantaged clients in the community. The club realised that, as well as making masks, they needed to lend a voice of support to encourage everyone to wear masks and practise social distancing. They gained permission to sell the masks on a stall in the local shopping centre, meeting two important goals at once: visibly supporting mask wearing and raising funds to cover the cost of making them. Recognising that daily commuters from the area to Sydney were a possible vector for the virus coming into the local community, club members spent several mornings promoting and selling masks at Morisset Railway Station. While still focusing locally, the masks started to pop up as far afield as Darwin. And as Australia began to get control of the virus, the group did not stop making masks. By that time the US was in serious trouble, so they packed up hundreds of masks and sent them to a Rotary club close to the border between Arizona and Mexico where the virus was out of control.



Following the outbreak of COVID-19 in western NSW recently, the Rotary Club of Morisset has started sending masks to local indigenous communities. They have also reached out to the Royal Flying Doctor Service and are hoping to distribute masks via flights to remote indigenous communities.

More boxes of masks were soon sent to Timor Leste, Papua New Guinea and India. In most cases, the donated masks were sent to a Rotary club that had the local knowledge and volunteers to ensure they were given to the neediest in their communities.

Club members have used social media to promote the project, and the level of engagement and donations shows it has strongly resonated with the community. People have offered to make masks, donated fabric, given cheap freight rates, and access to meeting halls without charge.

The project was also recognised in New South Wales Parliament when the Independent Member for Lake Macquarie (and supporter of Rotary), Greg Piper MP, read a commendation to the Rotary Club of Morisset in a speech to the house.

Most recently, the founder and CEO of a local hat business, Bedhead Hats, donated more than 3000 high-quality fabric masks for the club to include with their handmade masks, allowing more frequent and bigger parcels of masks.

Always innovating, the club recently created a new design that not only minimises fogging of glasses but is quicker and easier to make. They are currently negotiating exemptions on import duties to allow parcels to be sent to Nepal and Fiji.

The Rotary Club of Morisset understands that a few hundred masks is a tiny drop in the ocean of need for countries experiencing runaway COVID. But they also know that to every person who gets a mask, who otherwise may not have, it is important. Whatever the recipient is going through – they are not alone.

The masks are also a way for the club to reach out and give material support to fellow Rotarians in areas not doing so well with the pandemic.

With donations of fabric, labour and free working venues, the major cost now is freight. Australia Post and DHL give the club good rates where they can, but if other clubs would like to help, cash donations to assist with freight costs would be greatly appreciated.

If other clubs are also interested in making masks and looking for a start, the group would love to share their design, templates and tips at one of their workshops. Clubs are encouraged to send a representative who can sew and teach their members.
